All Dept wise Teachers refers to the standard reference books prescribed by University along with latest information available through online and other resources for effective implementation of curriculum. Besides the use of conventional method, various other teaching methods, like Quiz, Group discussion, power point presentations, Field visits, videos, Assignments, use of charts and graphs etc., are used for

effective curriculum implementation. Based on the result analysis of every course curriculum corrective measures were suggested in university board of studies meeting and college academic reviews meetings. The outcomes were recorded in the concerned departmental activity registers.
