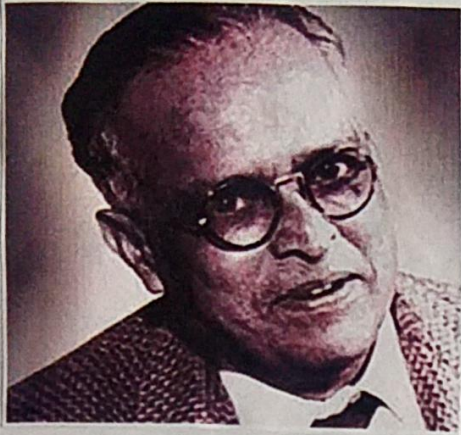

R. K. Narayan



Rasipuram Krishnaswami Iyer Narayan Swami (RK Narayan) was a well-known Indian writer famous for his set of work and writing in the fictional South Indian town of Malgudi. He was one of the leading and famous authors of early Indian literature written in English along with two others, Mulk Raj Anand and Raja Rao.

Narayan's greatest achievement was to make India accessible to the outside world through his writing and powerful words in his literature. Narayan's biography is always centered on his friendship with Graham Greene. Because he was Narayan's mentor and close friend. He was actively involved in identifying and getting publishers for Narayan's first four books.

In 1941, he founded his own publishing house and his works quickly found a permanent and favorite place in the bookshelves of almost all the Indian homes. When he was at the peak of his fame in his successful career, Narayan was then awarded a Padma Bhushan in 1964 and 36 years later, just a year before his death at 94, another prestigious Padma Vibhushan award in 2000.

Narayan was critically ill and hospitalized with cardiovascular problem two weeks ago in Madras, the capital of the southern state of Tamil Nadu, where he was born in 1906.

Early Life:

Narayan was born in 1906 in Madras (Now renamed and known as Chennai, Tamil Nadu), British India into a normal Hindu family. He was one of eight children his parents have had and Narayan was second among the sons; his younger brother Ramachandran was an editor at Gemini Studios, and the youngest brother Lakshman was a successful cartoonist.

Narayan spent the early years of his life in Madras in the care of his grandmother and a maternal uncle and joined his parents mainly only during the vacations.

At that time, India was still treated as the most important of the British empire, a colony held since in 1857.

Education:

R.K. Narayan attended a number of schools than a usual student would as in Madras while living with his grandmother, in which the main school was the Lutheran Mission School in Purasawalkam, C.R.C. High School, and Christian College High School.

Narayan was an avid and passionate reader who grew up reading Dickens, Wodehouse, Arthur Conan Doyle, and Thomas Hardy.

After completing high school, Narayan failed the university entrance examination unfortunately but got to have lots of time to spend a year at home reading and writing; and then he successfully passed the final examination in 1926 and joined Maharaja College of Mysore.

RK. Narayan was always found devoted and dedicated to reading whenever he got time.

Awards and Honors.

Among the best works of RK Narayan among his 34 novels, *The English Teacher* (1945), *Waiting for the Mahatma* (1955), *The Guide* (1958), *The Man-eater of Malgudi* (1961), *The Vendor of Sweets* (1967), and *A Tiger for Malgudi* (1983) were the best.

His novel *The Guide* (1958) won him the most prestigious national prize of the Indian Literary Academy which was his country's highest honor. Narayan received many other awards and honors including the AC Benson Medal from the Royal Society of Literature.

The Padma Bhushan and the Padma Vibhushan, India's second and third highest civilian awards, and in 1994 the Sahitya Akademi fellowship, the highest honor of India's national academy

of letters. He was also once nominated to the Rajya Sabha, which is the upper house of India's Parliament & throughout his 6 yrs he focused on the education system.

Career: After getting married in 1933, Narayan became a reporter for a newspaper called 'The Justice' and in the meantime, he sent the manuscript of 'Swami and Friends' to his friend at Oxford.

Narayan was asked by the government of Karnataka to write a book to promote tourism which he republished in 1980 with the title of 'The Emerald Route'. In the same year he was named as the honorary member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

Trivia:

He was very fond of the publisher of the Hindu, N. Ram and used to spend all his time, towards the end of his life, conversing with him over coffee.

Narayan is regarded as one of the three leading English language Indian fiction writers, along with Raja Rao and Mulk Raj Anand.



Safe and healthy food and Combating

food adulteration

Food :

The issue of food safety is a universal concern. This is because everyone has to consume food. Food scares have been numerous in the United States in the past twenty years. This fact has motivated producers and consumers alike to take an active role in the safe and quality production of their food. This is a requirement for all people across the nation as well as the globe to be concerned about to be healthy and enjoy the food they must consume.



The United States of America has become one of the cheapest, most abundant, and safest food suppliers throughout the world. Consumers have driven our agriculture sector to be one of the most powerful in the world. Consumers have, if producers cannot ensure food safety for the

consumers, the people who trust agriculturists to produce and process their food will most assuredly admonish the economic livelihood and reputation of agricultural industries.

Managing food safety and hygiene (2011) states that we are all at some extent dependent on others to ensure that the food we eat does not harm us. We are all responsible for the food we consume.

HEALTHY FOOD:

The ministry of health and family welfare is responsible for ensuring safe food to the consumers. Keeping this in view, a legislation called "prevention of food Adulteration Act", 1954 was enacted. The objective envisaged in this legislation was to ensure pure and wholesome food to the consumers and also to prevent fraud or deception. The Act has been amended thrice in 1964, 1976 and in 1986 with the objective of plugging the loopholes and making the punishments more stringent and empowering consumers and voluntary Organisations to play a more effective role in its implementation.

The subject of the prevention of food

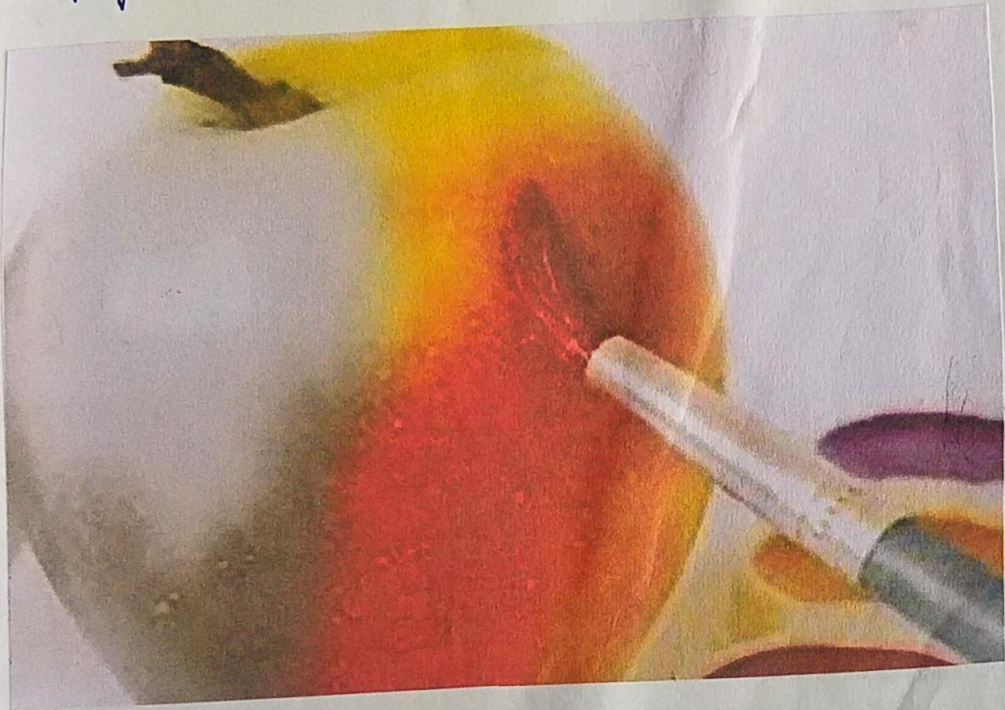
Adulteration is in the concurrent list of the constitution. However, in general, the enforcement of the Act is done by the state / UT governments. The central government primarily plays an advisory role in its implementation besides carrying out various statutory functions / duties assigned to it under the various provisions of the Act.



The laws regulating the quality of food have been in force in the country since 1899. Until 1954, several states formulated their own food laws. But there was a considerable variance in the rules and specifications of the food, which interfered with inter-provincial trade. The central Advisory Board appointed by the govt of India in 1937.

ADULTERATION :

Adulteration is a legal term meaning that a food substance fails to meet standards. It usually refers to non-compliance with health and safety standards.



While traditionally, Indian families used to cook food at home with healthy ingredients and knew what went into the meal, in modern times, with rising incomes and affluence, more and more people are moving away to readymade fast foods and eating regularly at restaurants. The food in many of these outlets is cooked with poor quality ingredients to attract and satisfy the palate.

Rather than provide a wholesome nutritional meal. we now have a lot more varieties and the choices are many. Though, some of us may not be aware of the fact that the food we consume may be adulterated, 25% to 30% of the food items in India are intentionally adulterated.

FOOD ADULTERATION:

Food adulteration is the adding or removal of any substances to or from food, so that the natural composition and quality is affected. Unintentional adulteration is a result of ignorance or the lack of facilities to maintain food quality. This may be caused by spillover effect from pesticides and fertilisers. Inappropriate food handling and packing methods can also result in adulteration.

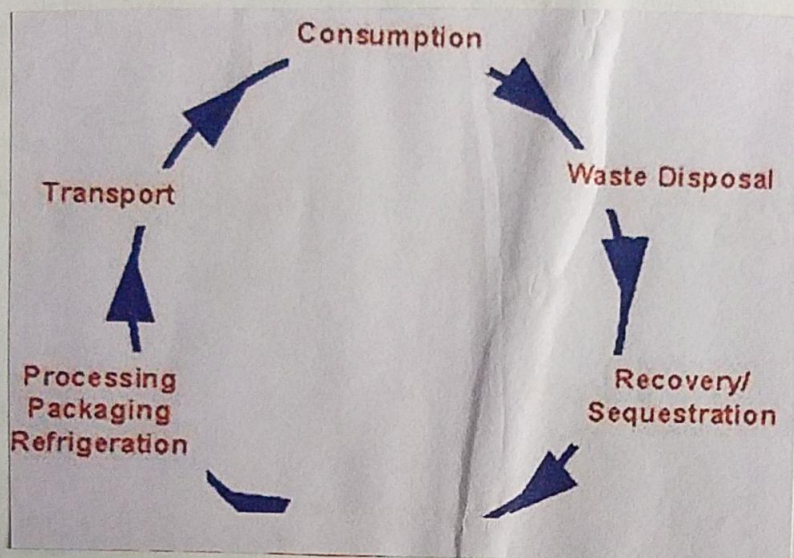


WHY IT IS DONE ?

Intentional food adulteration is usually done for financial gain. The most common form of intentional adulteration is colour adulteration. Some examples of intentional adulteration are addition of water to liquid milk, extraneous matter to ground spices, or the removal or substitution of milk solids from the natural product. Natural adulteration occurs due to the presence of certain chemicals, organic compounds or radicals naturally occurring in foods which are injurious to health and are not added to the foods intentionally or unintentionally. Some of the examples are toxic varieties of pulses, mushrooms, green and other vegetables, fish and seafoods. About 5,000 species of marine fish are known to be poisonous and many of these are among edible varieties.

Mineral oil may be added to edible oil and fats and can cause cancers. Lead chromate added to turmeric powder and spices can cause anaemia, paralysis, brain damage and abortions. Lead added to water, natural and processed food can lead to lead poisoning.

Lead poisoning causes foot drop, insomnia, constipation, anaemia, and mental retardation. Cobalt added to water and liquors and can cause cardiac damage. Copper, tin and zinc can cause colic, vomiting and diarrhoea. Mercury in mercury fungicide treated grains or mercury contaminated fish can cause brain damage and death.



Non-permitted colour or the permitted food colour like mentanil yellow, beyond the safe limit in the coloured food can cause allergies, hyperactivity, over damage, infertility, anaemia, cancer and birth defects.

THREAT TO CONSUMERS:

one is familiar with the famous saying of one of the past prime ministers of India describing corruption as universal and not confined to India. Same appears to be true with food adulteration also. It is surprising that the producers are always one step ahead of the safety agencies when it comes to detecting adulteration and their techniques are increasingly becoming more and more sophisticated with time.

Food frauds literally constitute a high-tech industry because of the enormous economic gains inherent in adulteration. Interestingly costlier the food

product, more incentive is available for evolving appropriate methods to mimic original product with cheap alternatives. There are some cases where there can be serious health consequences as illustrated when formalin was added to infant formula and pet food in order to falsify the level of protein content in these products.



The prevention of food adulteration act is a central legislation. Rules and standards framed under the act are uniformly applicable throughout the country. Besides, framing of rules and standards, India has been regularly attending various sessions of the codex Alimentarius commission.

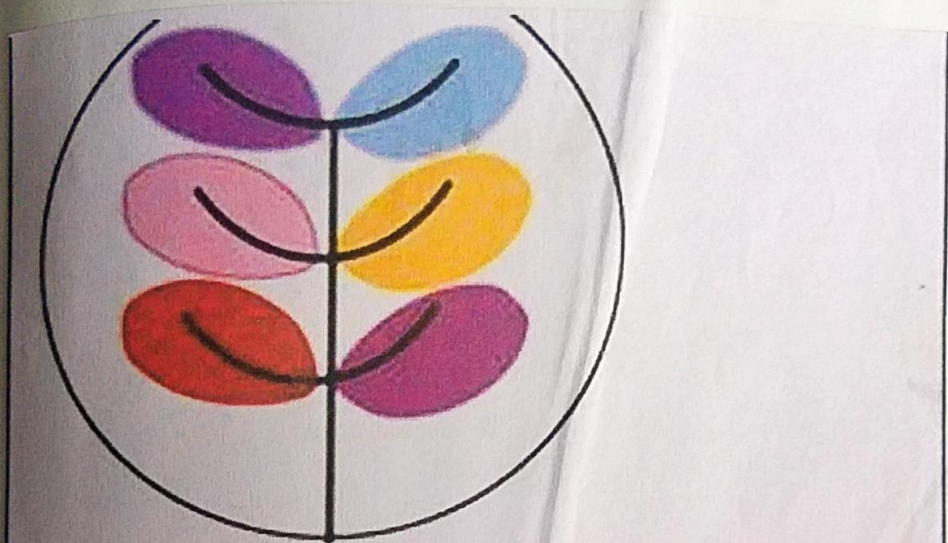

It was enacted to

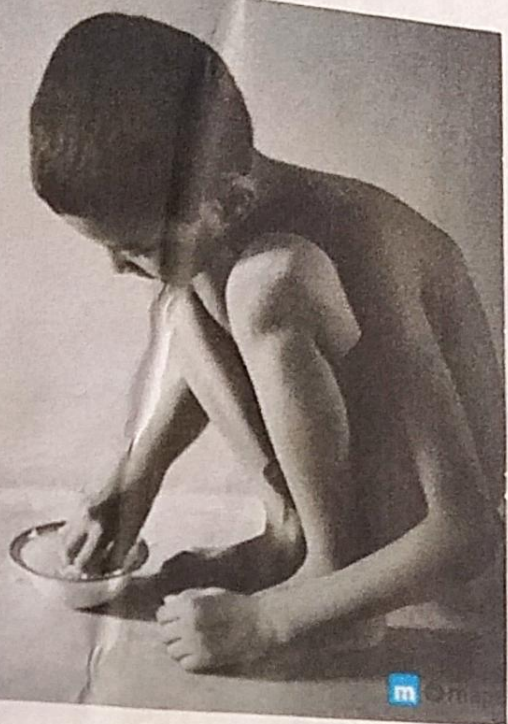

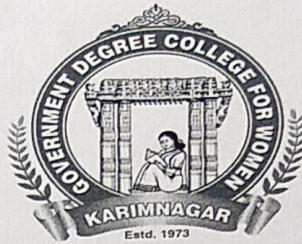
