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1. About the Department











11. Departmental Library

The college has a centralized library. However, for convenience and ready reference some books are maintained in the department and are kept at the immediate disposal of the members of the staff and students. Students are allowed to borrow any book - except the reference books such as dictionaries and encyclopedia - and return it in stipulated time. Besides the regular academic books, magazines such as Readers' Digest and The Week and Manorama Yearbooks are available in the library. The issue register is updated regularly.

12. Internal Assessment

In consonance with the academic calendar of the affiliating university, two Internal Assessment Tests are conducted in every semester. Each Internal Assessment Test will carry 20 marks which has two parts, comprising a written test for 15 marks and assignment for 5 marks. The average of the two Internal Assessments will be added to the final score of the student. After the Internal Assessment Test is over, the question paper is analysed and the answers are discussed in the classroom for the benefit of the students, especially those who scored less. The results of the Internal Assessment of each class are recorded in the registers of respective lecturers. They are also duly posted in the portal of the affiliating university, i.e. Osmania University.

13. Remedial Teaching

After each semester-end examination, the results are thoroughly discussed and analysed to identify the slow learners in order to provide them the necessary help and guidance to overcome their problems. The areas of difficulty of the student are thus identified and special care and attention are paid on those specific areas. In addition to the regular classes of the ongoing semester, special classes are taken for the slow learners identified. A separate register is maintained in the department with the details of the students and the classes. It has been observed that ever since the CBCS has been implemented, there is a slight decline in the pass percentage.

14. Guest Lectures

To augment the teaching-learning process, Guest Lectures are arranged as frequently as possible. Acknowledged teachers from various parts of the state are invited to deliver the guest lectures. It is a matter of pride to the department to state that one extension lecture was arranged online during the lockdown. As greater emphasis is laid on classroom seminars by students, not many Guest Lectures could be arranged in the past two years.

10. Student Seminars

16. Student Study Projects (Jignasa)

The Study Project is carried out under the supervision of teachers of the respective subjects. 



18. Best Practices

1. Wrappers to Riches
