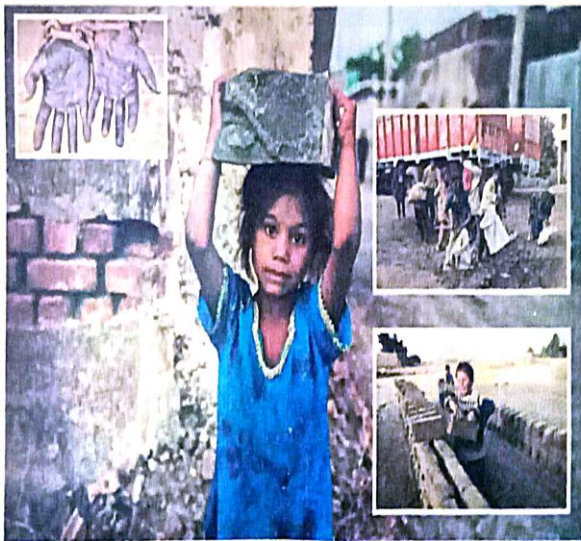

 PROBLEMS & PERSPECTIVES**

Introduction: Child labour has been an international concern because it damages, spoils and destroys the future of children. The problem of child labour is a serious matter not only in India but also in other developing countries. It is a great Social Problem. Children are the hope and future of a nation. Yet, there are millions of deprived children in our country who have never known a normal, carefree childhood. The law in Indian soil says that any child below age of 14 cannot be employed either in a factory or office or restaurant. In fact, India's international business has been severely affected in many cases because of child labour, violating human rights, have been used in some stage or the other in manufacturing, packaging a transport of those items. And, in a large number of cases of export of ready-made garments, prawn and several other items from India has been rejected on grounds of child labour being used. Truly speaking child labour is frequently utilized in India in various places of production and service e.g. small scale industry, restaurant service, domestic and shopkeeper's assistant, stone breaking, book binding, in fact in every house-hold industry India is sadly the home to the largest number of Child Labourers in the world. The census found an increase in the number of child labourers from 11.28 million in 1991 to 12.59 million in 2001. Poverty and lack of social security are the main causes of child labour. The increasing gap between the rich and the poor, privatization of basic services and the neo-liberal economic policies are causing major sections of the population out of employment and without basic needs. This adversely affects children more than any other group. Entry of multinational corporations into industry without proper mechanisms to hold them accountable has led to the use of child labour. Lack of quality universal education has also contributed to children dropping out of school and entering the labour force. A major concern is that the actual number of child labourers goes undetected. Laws that are meant to protect children from hazardous labour are ineffective and not implemented correctly. Child Labour is a multi-dimensional problem. Several factors are expected to be the causes of the participation of children in economic

activities. The causes are poverty, caste, tradition, size of the family, labour scarcity, wage rates, illiteracy, ignorance, and lack of school facilities, neighborhood effect etc. the factors are interlinked and exert their influence directly on the work participation of Children. Poverty needs more Income, Caste Factors, Growing Illiteracy, Big Family Curse, Cheap Child Labour, Absence of Family Allowance Scheme, and Cultural Factor.

- To throw light on the nature of work that these unfortunate children under take because of their compulsions
- To assess the work load of the Children and facilities provided to them by their employers
- To assess the effectiveness of the operation of Child Labour welfare legislations at the hands of the government
- To improve the working conditions of the Child and offered him opportunities to grow into a good citizen.
- To highlight the role of judiciary in combating the problem of Child Labour in India
- To assess the measures taken by the ILO, UNICEF, IPEC to eliminate the Child Labour in India
