INTRODUCTION:

Gadwal, a small town on the banks of the river Krishna, is part of this sacred land. Gadwal is popularly known as "VIDWAD GADWAL", as the rulers of Gadwal Samsthan had a great reputation for men of letters, poets and scholars of Sanskrit and Telugu from far and wide places including Tamilnadu regularly visited the Gadwal Samsthan in those days.

Gadwal was connected by rail and road on the Hyderabad-Bangalore route, is situated 200 kms away from Hyderabad enroute to Bangalore. Gadwal has a railway station and many trains in this route connect Gadwal to many important places across India including Delhi, Jaipur, Thirupathi, Bangalore, Mysore etc. It is 15 kms away from National Highway No.7 and is connected at Erravalli Chaurastha. It is surrounded by 4 important towns on 4 sides, Mahaboobnagar on the North, Wanaparthy on the East, Kurnool on the South and Raichur of Karnataka on the West. Gadwal was in fact a part of Raichur district before the reorganization of the district of erstwhile Hyderabad state in 1956.

Despite the commendable history and glorious tradition, the common people of this midland remained outside the domain of modern higher education till 1960. The renowned freedom fighters and educationist Sri. D. K. Satya Reddy and Sri. Paga Pulla Reddy rose to the occasion and with their pioneering and persistant efforts, the long cherished dreams of the people became reality. That was the humble beginning of our college in this remote part of Andhra Pradesh.

Thus Maharani Adi Laxmi Devamma Arts & Science College, Gadwal, the first college in our district, was established in 1960 under private management with a great vision and mission to impart higher education to the economically backward region and to transform it into a knowledge society. The then prince, Raja Krishnaram Bhoopal, generously donated the entire royal fort and also Rs. 25000 cash for the establishment of the college. Hence the college is named after erstwhile queen (Raja Krishnaram Bhoopal's grandmother) of Gadwal Samsthan.

The college was taken over by the Government of Andhra Pradesh in 1964. Later it has got permanent affiliation to Osmania University, Hyderabad and permanent recognition under section 2(f) and 12(b) of UGC act. The college switched over to 10+2+3 system of education and Telugu as medium of

instruction in 1970, as per the policy of the state government. In 1996, the Government of Andhra Pradesh bifurcated the college into two separate colleges – Government Junior College, Gadwal and M. A. L. D. Government Degree College, Gadwal. The college when started in 1960 had only 5 groups with only 300 students. In recent years the college has introduced restructured courses with new departments such as computers, microbiology as per the needs of changing times. At present the college has 10 groups with 1,806 students.

Recently in 2008 the Government of Andhra Pradesh has started a new degree college for woman and temporarily running in the same premises. This however did not effect this college either in admission or in popularity. Even today this college is continuing its services for the students of entire midland that lies between the Krishna and Tungabhadra who have been aspiring for higher education.

The Maharani Adilakshmi Devamma Government Arts & Science Degree and P.G College, Gadwal, Jogulamba Gadwal District, was first established in the Year 1960 under a Private Management later after the Royal family of Gadwal Samsthan handed over the Royal Fort for educational purpose of the public. The College started functioning under government. In the beginning there were B.A and B.Sc., Courses. The College became the Center of Education for the Students for the assembly constituency namely Gadwal and Alampur. At present this college is providing Education in Both Medium in Three Groups in B.A., B.com,&B.sc.

ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

The Department of History was first started in the Year 1960 with English Medium. Later several renowned Lecturers work with dedication in this Department. From the year 1969-70 the Medium of instruction was changed From English to Telugu Medium and now we offering both mediums. Now the subject of History is a common subject for all B.A. Groups i.e., HEP,HPP,HEPA&HPCA, Groups. The Government has sanctioned 4 lecturer Posts in historys Department.

The work load per week is 22 Periods for each faculty. The Department of History strictly adhered to the academic Schedule as per the almanac of the Palamuru University and Staff Academic Schedule supplied by the College. Apart from the syllabus given, the Faculty members are trying to enlighten the Students on Regional, National and International historical Culture changes in the present time. Current HISTORY issues pertaining to the state and the country are discussed with the Students by referring to the News Papers and Magazines, National and Internationa Culture and Traditioall Journals, Important Websites.

The Department of history has been conducting Student Project Work, Extension Lectures, Certificate Courses and Open Discussion with eminent People on current Historical Topics to Enrich the Knowledge.











The department identifies certain contemporary issues which are not included in the syllabus as topics and arranges group discussions, extension lectures and seminars to highlight the contemporary issues for the benefit of the students.

In the year 2016-17, as a part of the unification of curriculum all over India, the Palamuru University adopted the Choice Based Credit System as an education system to pump in flexibility giving choice to the students rather than the system-imposed education. Under this system the university had adopted the semester system with classroom teaching of 90 working days and as an affiliated college we are following the same system. As Undergraduate Course in History is divided into 6 semesters and the student is supposed to acquire 110 credits to acquire the undergraduate degree. This structure adopted for imparting knowledge in History include the following:

As a component of flexibility and choice given to the students, the students can acquire credits by studying various other subjects outside History to qualify and acquire the undergraduate degree in History .The flexibility component in the curriculum under Choice Based Credit System includes DSC, DSE, AECC, SEC, and GE.


TEACHING PROCESS



The Department of History follows the traditional method of imparting Education to the students through the method of lecture. We emphasize on interaction and lecture method rather than monologue. We take up the topics listed under the syllabus and make an effort on our part to make them understand rather than propagate the information of the books. In this period of information explosion, the students of today have access to multiple sources of information. Hence, we the staff of the department concentrate on understanding the information rather than compiling information for the students. We also utilize the modern techniques of teaching methods including ICT, YouTube, Zoom, Webinars, etc. This had been possible more so during the period of lockdown where we had prepared several video lessons and passed onto the students. We had also undertaken e-classrooms on Zoom platform and help the students to undertake the process of learning by using the modern methods of teaching.

The learning methods for the students span over the traditional output to the modern. Emphasis is made not much on collection of information but the staff makes effort to see that the students develop the capability of understanding the information. We try to provide the alternates available and leave the decision making process on the individual students. We help them to understand and guide them towards fixing the objectives and choosing the path for achievements in life.

EVALLUATON

Evaluation is a continuous process and the department adopts the same. Evaluation of students takes place on a day-to-day basis. Several methods are adopted by the department to evaluate the students. Evaluation in modern times has gained importance. Hence, it becomes all the more important in the process of teaching and learning. Certificate has acceptance all over the world. Hence, the department takes up evaluation as an important component of teaching and learning. It starts with the lecture itself by generating questions in such a way that the students are encouraged to understand and respond. We also take up the traditional methods of evaluation such as arranging slip tests, and practice sessions, etc. wherein the student is provided with the feedback on their understanding of the concept and their way of presentation. This improves their understanding capabilities and presentation.

The system of evaluation under the new CBCS system also provides for the method of continuous evaluation. The system provides for 20 marks for internal continuous assessment and 80 marks for external assessment, which is conducted by the University at the end of the semester. The internal assessment include conducting an objective-based assessment including 10 multiple choice questions for 5 marks, 10 fill in the blanks for 5 marks, and 5 descriptive answers 1 to 5 lines carrying 5 marks. Two such internal assessments are conducted for the students and the average of the two is taken as a component for qualifying the exam. Another 5 marks assessment is designed in the form of assignment or presentation. Specialized topics are given for presentation and for assignment. We usually give important topics from the syllabus and make the students collect information and present it in required form so that it will be useful to them to write their theory examinations. The system of CBCS provides for 20 marks under continuous evaluation process and it is completely left to the department to make students active in the class.


ANCIENT CIVILIZATION AND CULTURE AS RELATED TO INDIA

According to consensus in modern genetics, <u>anatomically modern humans</u> first arrived on the Indian subcontinent from Africa between 73,000 and 55,000 years ago. [1] However, the earliest known human remains in South Asia date to 30,000 years ago. Settled life, which involves the transition from foraging to farming and pastoralism, began in South Asia around 7,000 BCE. At the site of <u>Mehrgarh</u> presence can be documented of the domestication of wheat and barley, rapidly followed by that of goats, sheep, and cattle.By 4,500 BCE, settled life had spread more widely, [2] and began to gradually evolve into the <u>Indus Valley Civilization</u>, an early civilization of the <u>Old world</u>, which was contemporaneous with <u>Ancient Egypt</u> and <u>Mesopotamia</u>. This civilisation flourished between 2,500 BCE and 1900 BCE in what today is Pakistan and north-western India, and was noted for its urban planning, baked brick houses, elaborate drainage, and water suppl


Beechupally is one of the famous shrines for the god Hanuman (Anjaneya Swamy). It is located on the banks of Krishna River at about 30 kilometers downstream after Jurala Project in JOGULAMBA GADWAL district, Telangana. The shores of Krishna River at this location are noted for carrying out obsequies to the departed souls as per the Hindu custom. The development of the shrine has been augmented by the passage of national highway (NH7) through the village. A road bridge built in 1950s helped trading between Telangana and Rayalaseema regions of the Andhra Pradesh. The bridge was one of the first connections between central/north India and south India. This highway is renumbered as NH-44 [National Highway 44 (India)]. Initially,

the shrine consisted a Hanuman temple about 200 meters away from the river and a Shiva lingam temple near the river. During the rainy season, the water flow becomes high enough to touch the Shiva lingam temple. A temple for Lord Rama was also built in the area in 1992. For the convenience of devotees, several ghats were built for pushkara snanam, a sacred bath that takes place every 12 years. Since then its development continued to expand. In 2004 pushkaras, the shrine was developed with greater facilities making it one of the major places for pushkara snanam (sacred dip). During 2016 Krishna Pushkaras the government of Telangana State made eloborate arrangements and constructed several ghats for the pilgrims.

The Beechupally shrine is near two islands on the Krishna River. A larger island (Gurram Gadda village) is about 10 km² area is populated with farmers due to its soil fertility. A smaller island on the east side is called Nizam Konda (port belongs to Nizam Nawabs).

Republic Day is a public holiday in India, when the country marks and celebrates the date on which the Constitution of India came into effect on 26 January 1950, replacing the Government of India Act 1935 as the governing document of India and thus, turning the

nation into a newly formed republic.^[1] The day also marks the transition of India from an autonomous Commonwealth realm with British Monarch as nominal head of the Indian Dominion, to a fully sovereign republic in the Commonwealth of Nations with the President of India as the nominal head of the Indian Union.

The Constitution was adopted by the Indian Constituent Assembly on 26 November 1949 and came into effect on 26 January 1950 with a democratic government system, completing the country's transition towards becoming an independent republic. 26 January was chosen as the date for Republic day because it was on this day in 1930 when the Declaration of Indian Independence (Purna Swaraj) was proclaimed by the Indian National Congress in lieu of the Realm status as a Dominion later instated by the departing British Regime.

Bathukamma is a flowers festival celebrated predominantly in Telangana^{[1][2]} and some parts of Andhra Pradesh.^[3] Every year this festival is celebrated as per Sathavahana calendar for nine days starting Mahalaya Amavasya (also known as Mahalaya Amavasya or Pitru Amavasya) till Durgashtami, usually in September–October of Gregorian calendar. Bathukamma is celebrated for nine days during Durga Navratri. It starts on the day of Mahalaya Amavasya and the 9-day festivities will culminate on "Saddula Bathukamma" or "Pedda Bathukamma" festival on Ashwayuja Navami, popularly known as Durgashtami which is two days before Dussehra. Bathukamma is followed by *Boddemma*, which is a 7-day festival. Boddemma festival that marks the ending of Varsha Ruthu whereas Bathukamma festival indicates the beginning of Sarad or Sharath Ruthu.athukamma represents cultural spirit of Telangana.^{[4][5]} Bathukamma is a beautiful flower stack, arranged with different unique seasonal flowers most of them with medicinal values, in seven concentric layers in the shape of temple gopuram. In Telugu, 'Bathukamma' means 'Mother Goddess come Alive' and Goddess Maha Gauri-'Life Giver' is worshipped in the form of Bathukamma – the patron goddess of womanhood, Gauri Devi.

Historically, bathukamma meant "festival of life" and was celebrated to thank Goddess Parvati for her blessings for the crop harvest and income she helped generate this (current) year and again ask her blessing for the next year.

It is the festival for feminine felicitation. On this special occasion women dress up in the traditional sari combining it with jewels and other accessories. Teenage Girls wear Langa-Oni/Half-Sarees/Lehenga Choli combining it with jewels in order to bring out the traditional grace of the attire.
