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6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The affiliating university designs the curriculum and the faculty members of the institution add additional curricular inputs. The institution analyses and ensures that the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved through the periodic review meetings and follow-up action.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The institution sensitizes its stakeholders on issues like gender, inclusion, environment etc. through various activities. The institution identifies the slow learners as well as advanced learners by indicators like their marks, responses, behaviour, skills, and provides need based guidance, material, special classes, remedial classes and other opportunities.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Evaluation is done from the beginning through the final examinations. The quality of teaching and learning process is being monitored by the Principal through feedback taken at regular intervals from the students and the faculty. The student achievement is measured through formative approach by way of class room interactions and activities, and through summative approach by way of pre-final and final examinations.
- Annual Examinations are conducted and evaluated by the Affiliating University.
- However, home exams are conducted and evaluated by the college for the benefit of the students.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The faculty members are encouraging the students to take up action research programmes through study projects and field studies in the concerned subject areas to inculcate the attitude of scientific observation and research spirit. The laboratory facilities of departments of Zoology, Botany, Physics, Chemistry and Computers will also develop research ability among the students.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- The College has a common library with text books, reference material, magazines, scholarly journals and newspapers. It is supported by a reading room which is used by the students and the staff during zero hours of the college. The library resources, which are key resources for augmentation of the teaching learning process, are utilized by the faculty as and when required.
- The College has well furnished infrastructure viz. Classrooms and Laboratories for different departments, Internet facility, Library, Audio visual aids like LCD and Computers. A big classroom is available for co-curricular and cultural activities. The college provides sports facilities for physical fitness, outdoor games and indoor games.
- The ICT resources like internet, computers and projector for PPTs are being utilized by
 most of the staff members for teaching/learning activities and for preparing study materials.
 The student is made central in learning activities, by either making him personally gather
 information from the internet or by watching projected videos or video clips related to the
 topic to be learnt.
- Library is well equipped with text books; SOUL software is installed and subscribed to N-List INFLIBNET to access e-journals.
- All major departments, English Language Lab, Library and office have INTERNET facility which can be accessed by both students and staff.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The students get into contact and interaction with community when they are
 involved in social activities like superstitions, HIV AIDS, Literary programmes,
 blood donation, clean and green and they participate in all national and religious
 festivals with fervor and enthusiasm organised by National Service Scheme. They
 all help the students to have civic sense, social concern and the team spirit.
- Teaching and non-teaching staff are encouraged to participate workshops,
 Orientation courses, Refresher courses, faculty development programmes and seminars with on-duty facility for their overall enrichment.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff Recruitment

- Regular Teaching faculty is recruited by Andhra Pradesh Public Service Commission, Regular Non-Teaching faculty by Government of Andhra Pradesh. Contract Teaching faculty is recruited by the C.C.E. A.P., Hyderabad and Regional Joint Director, Collegiate Education, Warangal and Outsourced Non-Teaching faculty is recruited by the qualified agency.
- State Government recruits and appoints the staff by way of direct recruitment and promotions from the cadre of junior lecturers with necessary qualifications as prescribed by UGC

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- Industry interaction can be extended with Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the institution and industry with mutual benefit without meeting any financial burden.
- Students are taken to industries for study tours
- Departments are encouraged to develop linkages and collaborations with industries

6.3.9 Admission of Students

• The criteria adopted for admission to various programmes is merit based besides reservation rules framed by the state government. In order to maintain the objective of social equilibrium the reservation policy is implemented transparently in admission of backward class students (SC/ST/BC/Minority/ the differently abled) which is as per the stipulated guidelines, reservation rules and regulations laid by the concerned authority. The institution has introduced new courses i.e. B.Com. (Computer Applications) and B.Sc (Computer Science), on the basis of demandratio analysis. Students are admitted on the basis of merit and reservations prescribed by the state Government

ANNEXURE - I CONDUCTING OF YOGA CLASSES

As the yoga is the ancient Indian system of healing and curing the physical and psychological ailments, it is introduced to the students to have holistic personality. The goal is to

- Bring about behavioral changes
- Increase the emotional quotient of the students
- Helps the students have physical and mental health, agility, memory and concentration in their studies.

As the students are going to step out either for higher studies or for employment/self employment, they need to develop their emotional quotient along with the professional competence for succeeding amid challenges they would be facing in life. They also have to behave as responsible citizens. Yoga plays a helpful role in this context.

The students are provided with theory cum practical classes for an hour a week on the campus and they are advised to practice daily from half an hour to one hour in their homes. Mr. M. Madhukar Rao, Lecturer in Hindi takes Yoga classes for the faculty members and students. In addition, some other Yoga classes are arranged by inviting experts from outside, like Brahmakumari Samaj members.

The stakeholders of the institution have been benefitted with the practical cum theory classes of Yoga. There is a behavioral change among the students. They now appear to have peaceful mind and are participating in the curricular and co106 curricular activities positively. Yoga helped the students to control the temptations and to overcome the problems of maladjustment with the peers, the faculty and the society. The emotional quotient has increased considerably by practice of yoga.

There are certain problems in conducting the yoga classes on the campus. Particularly the early hours are the most suitable time for practicing yoga but the students cannot turn up at that time to the institution. The institution has no auditorium to practice yoga. There is no specially trained member of the faculty to train up the students. The institution requires an indoor stadium or auditorium for the students to practice yoga. It requires a well trained Yoga master for conducting classes.

In the beginning the faculty faced problems in teaching the values to the students because they strongly believed that they knew all these issues. They also felt that the values taught by the teachers were not going to help them in any way in their day to day life. They had doubts regarding the practicality of the values. They felt that what they learn in the classroom would not match with the reality outside. But the patient explanations, sympathetic attitude and persuasive efforts of the staff prevailed in winning over the students.
