Origin eg: German, Malasiya.

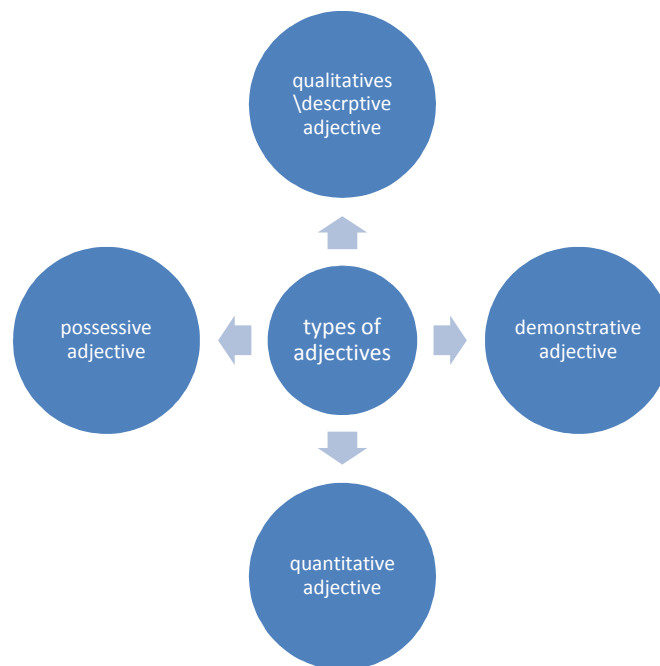
Material eg: Glass, metal.

TYPES OF ADJECTIVES



1. QUALITATIVE \DESCRIPTIVE ADJECTIVE:

TO DESCRIBE THE QUALITY OF A PERSON OR THING FOR EXAMPLE SIZE GENERAL DESCRIPTION AGE, SHAPE , COLOUR, MATERIAL, MATERIAL ORIGIN AND PURPOSE.

Example: Tall, Excellent, young, plastic.

1. The student achieved excellent result
2. The tall girl is my classmate.

2 QUANTITATIVE ADJECTIVE:

To indicate the number or amount of things.

Example: much, whole, all, no, any

1. She found many pens under the table.
2. There was no milk in the jug
3. There are thirty seven students in this class.

3. DEMONSTRATIVE ADJECTIVES

To point out noun.

Example: this, these, that, those.

1. This is my friend Chandu.
2. Those books belong to her.

4. Interrogative adjective:

Used with noun to ask question.

Example: what, whose, where, how, which.

1. Whose pen is this?
2. Which way shall we go?

5. POSSESSIVE ADJECTIVES:

Used to show possession

Example: my, your, his, her, our.

1. This is her hat.
2. Their parents came to my house yesterday.

6. DISTRIBUTIVE ADJECTIVE:

To show that the persons or things are counted collectively

Example: each, every, either and neither.

1. Each participant was asked to complete a survey.
2. Either of the movies would be interesting to me.

7. COMPOUND ADJECTIVE:

Made up of two or more words.

Example: light-weight, part-time, cool –blooded.

1. We have to be opened –minded about things.
2. The lady is wearing a pair of high-heeled shoes.
