2.1 Curricular Aspects: 2.1.1 Curricular Design & Development:	 Being an affiliated college it follows the syllabi prescribed by the university. Institution prepares action plan for the implementation of curriculum prior to the beginning of the academic year. Eight faculty members on various boards of studies of the university contribute to design and revision of the syllabi. Institution has developed curriculum for certificate courses.
2.1.2 Academic flexibility:	 Academic flexibility is limited. Embroidery, Beautician and Mehandi certificate courses are introduced. Institution offers 7 self-financed programmes, out of which, 4 are at UG level and 3 are at PG level. Five add on courses are offered.
2.1.3 Curriculum Enrichment	 Women empowerment cell organizes programmes on gender issues and climate change. TSKC imparts courses on communication, computer and analytical skills.
2.1.4 Feedback System	 Informal feedback on curriculum is in place. Feedback mechanism needs to be institutionalized. One UG and three PG programmes were introduced during the review period.
2.2 Teaching- Learning & Evaluation:2.2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile :	 Percentage of marks ranges from 36 to 98 percent in UG admission. Demand ratio is more for commerce course. On line admission at UG level is based on merit while admission to PG courses is through common entrance test.
2.2.2 Catering to Student Diversity:	 Around 95% students belong to SC/ST/OBC categories. Advanced learners are motivated to participate in seminars and workshops. Remedial classes are conducted.

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2.2.3	Teaching-Learning Process:	 Interactive learning is promoted through debates, group discussions, speech competitions and student seminars. ICT enabled teaching learning needs to be strengthened. English medium of instruction needs to be emphasized.
2.2.4	Teacher Quality:	 Out of 19 permanent teachers, 5 are Ph.D., and three are M.Phil., holders. 40 percent faculty members are served as resource persons. One teacher received state level best teacher award and another teacher is on the Executive Council of the NCERT, New Delhi. Structured feedback mechanism on teachers is in place.
2.2.5	Evaluation Process and Reforms:	 Choice based credit system with semester pattern is introduced from the current academic year. Internal assessment has 20 % component for PG courses. Practical tests are introduced for Economics and English.
2.2.6	Student Performance and Learning Outcomes:	 Performance of the students is monitored through home assignments, seminars, study projects etc. Learning outcome of each course needs to be specified. University examinations results in some courses need to be improved.
2.3 2.3.1	Research, Consultancy & Extension: Promotion of Research:	 Research committee is constituted to encourage faculty members to undertake research. National seminars and workshops are organized by four departments. No research projects have been taken up. Thrust areas of research need to be identified.
2.3.2	Resource Mobilization for Research:	 Provision of financial assistance for research in the budget needs to be made. Interdisciplinary research activities are yet to be initiated. Resource mobilization for research is not visible.
2.3.3	Research Facilities:	 Research facilities are yet to be created. More e-resources and journals need to be acquired. Existing laboratories need to be upgraded.
2.3.4	Research Publications and Awards	 Only nine publications by the faculty members during the review period. Teachers need to be encouraged to publish research papers in reputed journals.
